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- Results for most grades are encouraging (for the baseline data) because scores are gradually increasing
- In terms of Strive HI data, KA is in the top 16 schools for student growth (66% in reading); math still needs a lot of improvement but scores showed growth as well (as far as in the complex area)

L.Trinidad discussed her one-page summary of results:

- Quite surprised at the chronic absenteeism (20%), which needs to be addressed; thinking of a strategy to reduce the number such as awareness and conferences not only within the school but an island effort
- Results showed that students didn't do very well in science; will continue the positive momentum in math and reading (as far as points go, KUU are right alongside Lanikai and Waialae)
- Concern: transitioning to the Common Core and keeping up with technology (keyboarding, type-tolearn, internet access)

Highlights of M.Horne's Waimea Middle School's results include:

 Academic Achievement highlights the amount of students that met proficiency; on the StriveHI results there are aggregate average for reading and math (broken down by grade level)

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		 In looking at the baseline in math you can see where the school's strengths lie (teacher strengths as well) Put into place intervention courses for every student that is off track or below proficiency Enjoy the STAR Assessment because it can be given weekly Better results in math this year than last; poor results in reading. Using the (real-time) data to help place students in intervention courses
