School Bus Fundraising Blasts Into High Gear!

Sustainability — for Waimea Middle School — looks, sounds and smells like — a **BUS!** In fact, 2 buses! Simply put, WMS spends about \$150,000 a year on student busing and research tells us it would cost less <u>over the long haul</u> to own and operate our own buses. Also, doing so would enable us to save up to \$61,000 a year, and we could redirect these savings into the classroom to benefit student learning!

This is, in part, the rationale behind our **WASC Accreditation**



Recommendation to work toward a sustainable budget. There is no single "silver bullet" to resolve our fiscal challenges, but buying school buses is a significant first step. Toward this end, we have found two generous funders willing to help us move into high gear. The first is **The Neilan**

Foundation, which underwrote our Accreditation celebration that included a School-Community Steak Fry this past

Community Steak Fry this past May. The event was free but

donations were suggested to start our school bus fund drive, and thanks to everyone's generosity, we raised \$732.85 that evening. Then, the **Windermere Foundation** (aka C&H Properties' Waimea real estate team) voted to again make a significant donation to our school of \$2,000 for buses! Then **The Neilan Foundation** stepped forward and contributed their promised "seed money" of \$25,000! So our total raised to date for school buses is \$27,732.85!

Clearly, this is just the beginning as we estimate needing about \$120,000 to buy, ship and prep two buses but our plan is to have them ready to roll at the start of the 2015-'16 school year.

This is why Friday's "Take a LAP Fun Run/Walk" is so important. Please join us! And please help us extend a very warm mahalo to The Neilan Foundation (Mr. and Mrs. Tom Gimbel will be here with us), the Windermere Foundation and to all who have helped us get this ball (oops—bus) rolling!

Students-Families-Community Invited To 'Welcome Back Talk-Story' With Hokule'a & Hikianalea Crews Returning From Tahiti, Rarotonga & Samoa Leg of World Wide Voyage



WMS students, families, faculty and staff — and the entire Waimea community — are invited to a "Welcome Back Talk-Story" with crew members from Leg 2 of the World Wide Voyage (WWV) of the Hōkūle`a and Hikianalia sailing canoes from 1-3 p.m., Sat., Sept. 13 at HPA's Gates Theatre. There is no charge. Seating is limited and first come.

Leg 2 crew members who have returned safely from the "Mālama Honua" WWV which took them from the isles of Tahiti to Avana and Aitutaki Rarotonga (Cook Islands) and ending in Pago Pago, Samoa, will share their experiences detailing their 52-day journey through mele, `oli, talk-story, photos and video.

Leading the presentation will be **PWO Navigator Chadd Paishon**, who took on the sail master and captain responsibilities for this leg of the WWV on board Hōkūle`a. A complete list of crew members, many of whom are expected to participate in this "Welcome Back Talk-Story" follows.

"Hawai'i Program to continue to connect the community and especially the current generation of students, teachers and families with this historic voyage.

This voyage continues to bring our community together. Area schools including Kanu o ka 'Āina, Waimea Middle School, Parker School and HPA Middle School have all adopted "Mālama Honua" as their schoolwide theme for the year so that students and their immediate families will learn about the significance of this voyage as each leg is completed and each school creates opportunities for learning about the deeper meanings of 'Mālama Honua'," said Pomai Bertelmann, a Waimea educator and an experienced voyager with Na Kalai Wa'a and wa'a 'ohana member who will serve as one of two Education Specialists for Leg 4 of the WWV from Pago Pago, Samoa to Aurere-Mangonui, Aotearoa.

Concluding the talk-story will be the continued learning of the chant, "Kaulana E Ka Holo a Hōkūle'a," which is a pauku (verse) of a Hokule'a mele inoa (genealogy) chant that is being shared with students, families and voyaging friends islandwide.

For a 5th consecutive year, the Trustees for the Office of Hawaiian Affairs have awarded a \$1.5 million grant to the Hawaiian-focused public charter schools...of which Waimea Middle School is one.

The grant is expected to help the 17 Hawaiian-focused public



charter schools increase the achievement levels of Native Hawaiian students. About half of WMS' students are of Native Hawaiian ancestry.

Since 2010, the board of trustees has approved \$7.5 million in grant money for the 17 schools.

"We are especially grateful to Hawai'i Island **Trustee Robert Lindsey**, who also serves on our WMS Local Advisory Panel," said Principal Matt Horne.
